Washington 2006

 The 10th U.S. International Philatelic Exhibition, Washington 2006 – World Philatelic Exhibition, ran from May 27 thru June 3, 2006 at the Washington Convention Center in Washington D.C.



Origins of Springfield Stamp Club Involvement

- Washington 2006 representative Steve Luster and Gordon Morison spoke at the Springfield Stamp Club in 2001 asking, "Who will volunteer?"
- Since the show was five years off, Club members said sure.
- Beginning with the 2001 meeting, the Springfield Stamp Club made a yearly financial contribution to support the Washington 2006 organization.
- The Springfield Stamp Club thus became the first and one of the many philatelic organizations to support Washington 2006.

Catalog Sales and Palmares – Otto Thamasett



Fun Fact – the show catalog sold for \$20 and there were lines everyday of the show to buy them

Otto Thamasett was responsible for the sale of show catalogs. Eight pallets of 1,000 programs each were shipped to the Convention Center. The programs were shrink wrapped in bundles of 4 and had to opened to have stamps inserted. It took a team of four about two hours per pallet to get the job done!

As for sales, Otto had a team of six volunteers who sold the catalogs from a booth near the show entrance.

Otto helped to find a printer for the Palmares book of exhibit winners. The challenge was that he received the list of winners on the Thursday of the show and had to have 1,000 copies of the Palmares book by Saturday!

The Bin Room – Pat Kuch

Pat Kuch was new to stamp collecting in 2006 but was game to volunteer to support Washington 2006. Pat worked as a checker in the bin room. The bin room is where all the exhibits are checked in and stored prior to mounting them in the exhibit frames.

Checking one particular exhibit proved to be quite memorable. Before the owner brought it to her she noticed everyone in the room looking and oohing over it. When the owner brought the exhibit over to Pat to check it in, she thought it was a bunch of dirty old stamps showing depicting Washington and Franklin. Afterwords Pat found out she had checked in the Gross collection of rare American stamps, including the famous Z Grill. The value of the stamps Pat checked in was estimated to be between \$8 Million to \$10 Million!

In retelling the story, Pat admits she was glad she did not know the value of the stamps at the time as she would have been way too nervous!

Audio Visual – Gerry Frazier

If something was not working, such as a projector bulb, Gerry would alert the contractor supplying the A/V equipment and have them resolve the issue.

Gerry also was the PA announcer for several days to announce the show's official opening and closure!

Neal Parr had an interesting volunteer job at Washington 2006 – escorting Ben Franklin! A professional Ben Franklin re-enactor was hired to appear at the show. Neal walked him around during the five days that the reenactor was at the show. The re-enactor stayed in character the entire time and proved to be very popular with show attendees.

For Neal this was a great volunteer assignment as he was able to walk around the show floor and see everything and even more rewarding was that he was able to meet the many people that Ben Franklin interacted with.
